NYC Urban Agriculture

Soil-based

- Outdoors, ground-level or rooftop
- Often nonprofit/mission-driven

Controlled Environment Ag (CEA)

- Hydroponic greens & herbs
- Startups, educational nonprofits

Community Gardens

Beautification | Agriculture | Recreation

- 700 + community gardens and urban farms across 5 boroughs
- NYC's garden movement has played important role in building community and connecting citizens to their food source



Case Study: La finca Del Sur Garden



- Founded in 2009 through a cooperative led Black and Latina farmers in the South Bronx and guidance from MoreGardens
- A movement organized by local residents to reclaim unused lot
- Approximately ¼ acre
- Farms culturally relevant crops such as papalo, epazote and cilantro that are enjoyed and made accessible by local community members via South Bronx Farmers Market
- Goal(s): honor heritage, increased nutrition awareness, education, social and political advocacy for equality and food justice, economic empowerment

NYC Urban Agriculture

Community gardens + some sales

- Micro-enterprises; produce grown in community garden plots and home gardens
- ex: East NY Farms, Bronx Hot Sauce


Commercial Urban Farms

Case Study: Brooklyn Grange

- 4 sites (Sunset Park, Long Island City, Navy Yard, and Javits Center)
- 50,000 lbs of organically-cultivated produce per year
- National model for rooftop farming

Case Study: Red Hook Farms

- Serves over 5,000 Red Hook NYCHA residents annually
- Summer youth farm crew and educational programming
- Produce sold within community
- 2.75 acre production and compost site and 1.1 acre education farm at Red Hook Houses West (NYCHA)

The Future of Urban Agriculture in NYC: Green Infrastructure

- Low-income housing unit build on former brownfield in South Bronx
- Community engagement through gardening and interactive green spaces
- Green Roof: Reducing "urban heat island" effect



Indoor Farming



Incubator projects such as Square Roots, located at the former Pfizer factory feature an urban farming campus of hydroponic, climate controlled container farms.



Farm One, unique indoor farm in Manhattan growing rare herbs and greens, year-round is an example of vertical farming.


